

Getting the Scoop on Newspapers

A Brief History

The first newspapers goes back more than 500 years ago to the Renaissance when the news was spread by merchants via hand written newsletters. The news included information about wars, economic conditions, social customs and human interest features. The first printed forerunners of the newspaper appeared in Germany in the late 1400's in the form of news pamphlets or broadsides.

The predecessors of the newspaper in English-speaking countries were called corantos, small news pamphlets produced only when some newsworthy event happened. The first true newspaper in English was the *London Gazette* begun in 1666.

Classroom Newspaper

Newspapers are fun way to keep track of events in your classroom. First, decide who is going to work on what section of the newspaper. Then decide what news stories will be included.

Before you begin any work, its a good idea to have a look at a few different examples. Collect some from home, or find them at your local or school library. Take note of what sections you see. How long are the articles? How many photos are there? Are any illustrations or drawings included?

Some questions to ask:

- How many pages will your newspaper have?
- Who will write the articles?
- Who will draw the pictures and/or take the photos?
- How many articles, news stories, crosswords etc. will the newspaper have?

Look at the News

Do you ever wonder why something is in the newspaper? Before a story is included in the newspaper, or is considered newsworthy, it has to meet one or more of the following tests:

- Timeliness (did it happen recently)
- Nearness (how close did it happen to you)
- Consequences
- Conflict, drama, oddity or emotional impact

The more newsworthy the story is the closer to the front and/or top of the page it will be.

What to Do:

Read three different kinds of articles and use the rules above to determine why it was included in the newspaper. Answer these questions

Do you think it was newsworthy?

What could have made it more newsworthy?

Where was it located in the paper? Was it more newsworthy than the front page stories?

Did hear about news elsewhere that you thought was more newsworthy but wasn't in the paper?

Writing From the News

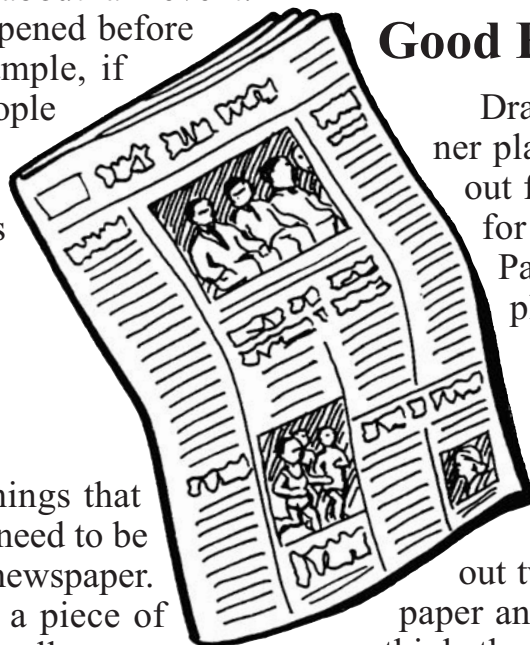
